

1. COUNTABLE AND UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS

COUNTABLE NOUNS: something I can count and I can number (ONE pen, TWO pens). They have both singular and plural forms

UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS: something I can't quantify, like water, sugar, money... They have just one form (we never say waters or sugars).

We can say a teaspoon of sugar / two teaspoons of sugar, but what we are counting are teaspoons (countable noun) and not sugar itself.

2. QUANTIFIERS

A/AN: SINGULAR COUNTABLE NOUNS

SOME: PLURAL COUNTABLE NOUNS, ALL UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS (AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES)

ANY: PLURAL COUNTABLE NOUNS, ALL UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS (NEGATIVE AND INTERROGATIVE SENTENCES)

3. ASKING QUANTITY

HOW MANY?: Countable nouns

HOW MUCH?: Uncountable nouns

MANY: COUNTABLE NOUNS (NEGATIVE AND AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES)

MUCH: UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS (NEGATIVE AND AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES)

A LOT OF / LOTS OF: BOTH COUNTABLE AND UNCOUNTABLE (AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES)

FEW (not much): pochi, insufficienti. UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS

A FEW (some): una piccola quantità. UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS

LITTLE (not much): pochi, insufficienti. COUNTABLE NOUNS

A LITTLE (some): una piccola quantità. COUNTABLE NOUNS
